## SOURCE CITATIONS

A source citation is the information that must be provided about the book, web site or other source of information used when conducting research for assignments. The following methods of source citation are in effect at The Valleys and at T. L. Kennedy SS.

**Book:** Author's name inverted. Title of the book. Place of publication: Publisher, copyright date.

Funston, Sylvia. The Book Qf You, Toronto: Owl, 2000.

**Encyclopedia Article:** Author if listed inverted. Title of the article quoted. Title of the encyclopedia underlined, edition.

Bliss, Michael. "Confederation of Canada". The World Book. 1999 edition.

**Internet Address:** write http:// and the full URL from the site where you are working underlined.

**CD ROM:** Title of the CD ROM underlined. Publisher, copyright date.

The 1998 Canadian & World Encyclopedia, McClelland & Stewart, Inc. 1997

**Video:** Title underlined. Series, if available. Producer. Copyright date.

**Interview:** Name of person interviewed. Date of the interview.

McCallion, Hazel. Personal interview. December 1. 2001.

**Magazine Article:** Author's name inverted. Title of the Article quoted. Title of the Magazine underlined. Date. Page numbers

**Almanac/Atlas:** if there is an author or editor, follow the directions for a book; if there is no author or editor, draw a line then follow book.

## PLAGIARISM

**Plagiarism** is a very serious offence for students completing research assignments. Students should not copy information directly from a source and must always acknowledge the sources used in research (source citation). This includes print materials, magazines, videos, CD ROMs, web sites, or pictures. Pictures are allowed **only** if they have come from CD ROMs, or the internet **and** have been properly cited immediately under the picture. Cut out pictures from magazines or books are NOT allowed at any time. (In the past, many books from the school library and the public libraries have been damaged by students who have cut out pictures to put in their projects.)

**Plagiarism will result in a mark of zero for that assignment.**
